Commemorating a 3 September ?

The deep friendship between the American and French peoples continues to be kept alive by the sacrifices and common struggle for shared values. Festivals and monuments remind us of those moments in history.

The Societies in France of the Daughters and of the Sons of the American Revolution reunite in the same spirit the direct descendents, residing in France, of those who fought for the liberty of the United States of America.

They propose to commemorate the 225th anniversary of the birth of the Republic the first week of September 2008 in Paris, in order to confirm the particular importance to this first fraternity in combat and destiny.

HISTORICAL REMINDER

It was on a Wednesday, September 3, 1783, 225 years ago, that the final step in the path to peace and independence for America occurred in Versailles.

The great European war powers --France, Spain and Great Britain -- finally signed the Treaties of Peace in which the British Crown recognized the independence of its former subjects.

The Count de Vergennes, Minister of Foreign Affairs for King Louis XVI, waited in order to have the treaties signed, for a messenger to confirm that, the same morning in Paris, the American and British delegates had truly signed the treaty whereby the British crown had just concluded with her former subjects the terms of her recognition of their independence. The long and costly support of the revolution across the sea by France, then her Spanish ally, had come to a close.

The treaties were the final step of the conflict begun on April 19, 1775, with the battle of Lexington between the British colonist insurgents and the English armed forces. From Saratoga to Brandywine, from Valley Forge to Yorktown, the Revolution that had cost the country so much was over, and the Republic had begun.

Paris and Versailles are rich, not only in places where these agreements were negotiated and ratified, but also due to so many others who have played an important role in the history of America and the friendship of our two countries.

At the Palace of Versailles, King Louis XVI had greeted the American delegation of Silas Deane, Benjamin Franklin and Arthur Lee as early as March 1778.

In front of the Palace, on the rue de l'Indépendance américaine, is the old Ministry of Foreign Affairs where the Count de Vergennes enacted a diplomatic strategy that held neutrality on one side and alliance on the other; the visits of the American Delegates followed.

In Paris, places of historical importance to American history are innumerable and are, for example: the Hôtel de Coislin, at Place de la Concorde, where was concluded the Alliance; Hôtel des Ambassadeurs de Hollande, where Beaumarchais organized desperately needed supplies for the insurgents; Picpus Cemetery where Lafayette is buried, in the American soil he brought back with him; as well as the mansions where Rochambeau, Lauzun, Franklin, Adams and Jefferson, among others, resided.

There are also numerous monuments built to the glory of these Americans and of these French who played a determining role in this long conflict.

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And France did not hesitate to erect monuments also to those who turned to this side of the Atlantic when they were needed. The memorial to the Escadrille Lafayette and the Museum of Franco-American Friendship at Blérancourt remind us of those who came freely from America, as early as 1914, to volunteer in French Air squadrons, of the ambulance corps serving a devastated civil population during WWI.

A generation later, the Americans were back to save France and Europe from the Nazi menace. Reminders of WWII are on nearly every Paris street, and many monuments and museums, such as the Mémorial de la Paix at Caen, as well as the American Cemetery near Omaha Beach, testify to the continued regard and respect in which those American sacrifices are held in France today.

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This anniversary is thus the occasion to commemorate in Paris by a series of manifestations from the 1st to the 5th of September, 2008, the sacrifices undertaken together and the perennial friendship which resulted.
