Washington-Rochambeau Revolutionary Route News January 2011

The National Park Service, along with all other federal agencies, awaits final action by Congress on the FY 2011 appropriation bill. We are operating under a continuing resolution. The President's FY2011 request provides sufficient funds to maintain visitor services in all areas and enhance services in a few. The FY 2012 budget is being formulated at this time by an Administration determined to put our Nation on sound fiscal footing. Although we are operating under a continuing resolution and facing an uncertain future, we are thinking and planning ahead and are preparing proposals for work that needs to be completed in future years. These include proposals for completing and printing the brochure, comprehensive planning and mapping of the trail. Given the uncertain and competitive funding situation, we will be seeking help and funds from a variety of sources within and outside of the NPS.

Joe and Samantha drafted a strategic plan and summary of the strategic workshops held last year. We will use the plan and summary of the workshops as the foundation for future strategic planning efforts and will incorporate broader public input as we move into a more detailed planning process. Samantha is undertaking an inventory of sites and possible tourism destinations along the full length of the Washington-Rochambeau Revolutionary Route NHT. We have also been consulting the *Report to Congress on the Historic Preservation of Revolutionary War and War of 1812 Sites*, multiple websites, and the state focused historical reports by Dr. Selig. We hope to categorize the sites by national, state, local or municipal management and ownership and also identify sites owned and managed by private organizations. The information collected will hopefully then be translated into Geographic Information System (GIS) maps.

Carolyn Suffern of the W3R-US has developed a spreadsheet that will be used for tracking and reporting the many volunteer hours dedicated citizens are putting towards this effort. We in NPS are grateful for all you do and we hope you will report your valuable contribution of time.

Kim Burdick (W3R-US) created a Facebook site that has dozens of photos of activities that the W3R-US supported or coordinated during the past decade. Visitors to the site have added

comments and photos. The W3R-US Facebook site is open to Facebook members only. If you are already a Facebook member the link below will take you to that site. If you are not a Facebook member the link will take you to a page where you may register for membership on Facebook. On January 10, 2011, Acqunetta Anderson National Chairman of the National Friends & Society of the W3R-NHT and Chairman of the W3R-DC hosted a conference call on Strategic Planning and asked Joe DiBello to discuss the Strategic Plan. The Trail Superintendent discussed the vision, mission and key objectives based on the input received to date. Additional opportunities will be provided as the planning process progresses. Carolyn Suffern, Janet Burnett, W3R-NY, Jim Raleigh W3R-NJ and Vice-Chair of the National Washington- Rochambeau Revolutionary Route Association, Inc. (W3R-US), Bill Conley, Chairman of the W3R-DE and Mary Margaret, W3R-MD participated.

Joe DiBello attended a Jan 19 meeting organized by Robert Reyes (W3R-MD) with Harford County, MD Executive David Craig and staff, Peg Niland, Harford Land Trust, Inc. and Darlene Perry, Executive Director the Havre de Grace Maritime Museum to discuss the preservation potential of an encampment site adjacent to and connecting public open space land in Bel Air. Robert and Joe then toured a proposed NHT route that Robert mapped out in Baltimore.

Janet Burnett (W3R-NY) invited Joe to participate in a January 20, 2010 conference call of the Rockland County, NY Historic Preservation Board. The purpose was to build awareness about the W3R NHT and help them incorporate the NHT into area plans and initiatives.

The Marcher's are planning a June 2011 to October 2011 walk along the W3R NNT. We think this a great opportunity to feature some local events and engage local communities along this more than 700 mile route. We are looking for ways that NPS can help or participate. Please let Joe know if you have any suggestions or ideas.

We continue to receive more and more requests for information, comment and assistance from organizations and the general public. We are doing our best to provide timely, helpful responses and referrals. We are also moving ahead with plans to get the NPS web page up and running and we are exploring the application of social media.

In cooperation with the New Jersey Historic Trust, the Connecticut Trust for Historic Preservation, and Preserve Rhode Island, funding in the form of 1:1 matching grants up to

\$15,000 are available for exterior painting, security and fire detection systems, roof and window restoration, sill repair/replacement, and chimney re-pointing for sites in NJ, CT, RI. Save America's Treasures grants announcement.

The National Park Service (NPS) and the President's Committee on the Arts and the Humanities (PCAH) jointly announced the awarding of \$14.3 million in federal competitive Save America's Treasures (SAT) grants. The grants are made in collaboration with the National Endowment for the Arts (NEA), the National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH), the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS), and Save America's Treasures' private partner, the National Trust for Historic Preservation. With the grants, 61 organizations and agencies will conserve nationally significant cultural and historic sites, buildings, objects, documents, and collections. NEA Offers Community Planning Grants

The National Endowment for the Arts (NEA) is offering two grant opportunities for community organizations and local governments to help with regional planning and community improvement.

- The first -- Your Town: The Citizens' Institute on Rural Design -- is designed to help nonprofits, community organizations, and local governments tackle critical regional planning issues through design by bringing design professionals to a community for a multi-day workshop. Up to \$22,000 is available for towns with populations under 50,000. The application deadline is February 25.
- The second -- Our Town -- is intended to help communities build new vitality, economic vigor and livability around the arts. A limited number of grants, ranging from \$25,000 to \$250,000, are available for "creative place making projects." The application deadline is April 25.
