

Washington-Rochambeau Revolutionary Route News

The National Park Service, along with all other federal agencies, awaits final action by Congress on the FY 2011 appropriation bill. We are operating under a continuing resolution. The President's FY2011 request provides sufficient funds to maintain visitor services in all areas and enhance services in a few. The FY 2012 budget is being formulated at this time by an Administration determined to put our Nation on sound fiscal footing. Although we are operating under a continuing resolution and facing an uncertain future, we are thinking and planning ahead and are preparing proposals for work that needs to completed in future years. These include proposals for completing the brochure; begin comprehensive planning; and preparing maps of the trail. Given the uncertain and competitive funding situation, we will be seeking help and funds from a variety of sources within and outside of the NPS.

Joe DiBello and Samantha Driscoll drafted a strategic plan and summary of the strategic workshops held last year. We will use the plan and summary of the workshops as the foundation for future strategic planning efforts and will incorporate broader public input as we move into a more detailed planning process. Samantha is undertaking an inventory of the route and sites and possible tourism destinations along the full length of the Washington-Rochambeau Revolutionary Route NHT. We have also been consulting the Report to Congress on the Historic Preservation of Revolutionary War and War of 1812 Sites, multiple websites, and the state focused historical reports by Dr. Selig. We hope to categorize the sites by national, state, local or municipal management and ownership and also identify sites owned and managed by private organizations. Here's a Google Map of the PA Route. The maps and information will then be translated into Geographic Information System (GIS) maps.

Kim Burdick (W3R-US) created a Facebook site that has dozens of photos of activities that the W3R-US supported or coordinated during the past decade. Lanny Patten, Chair of W3R PA, is in touch with Valley Forge to discuss a proposed donation of a bust of General Duportail for display. Duportail came to America from France to aid in the War for Independence. Duportail was first commissioned colonel of engineers and later was promoted to brigadier-general. In 1778, after consultation with his staff, Washington decided to go into winter quarters with his army on the hills of Valley Forge. Generals Knox and Duportail agreed Valley Forge presented a good strategic location for the troops. Knox established the general lines of the camp and Duportail worked with him to develop the details. Prior to the siege at Yorktown, Washington met with Rochembeau, de Chastelleux, Knox and Duportail, to plan the defeat the British.

On March 14, Sal Lilienthal, Director of the Bicycle Tour Company, based in Kent CT visited our office. Sal provided an overview of the Revolutionary War biking routes he has laid out and would like to publish. Several of the routes follow the Washington Rochambeau Route. I informed Sal about the American Revolution Center and about Bill Poindexter's bicycling initiative so that they could coordinate.

On March 15, I participated in a conference call with the Potomac Heritage Scenic Trail Association. The group is planning a walking route from Mount Vernon to Prince William Forest Park. An area workshop is being planned for May 4th or 5th to discuss routes. I provided contacts for Mount Vernon and the Marchers. I will continue to coordinate with Don Briggs, Superintendent of the Potomac Heritage Scenic Trail, as we plan our work in Virginia.

Joe spoke with Jamie Bosket, at George Washington's Mount Vernon about collaborating with them on events they have planned for Sept 9, 10 and 11 including an encampment, reenactment, and ceremony commemorating the events that occurred there. We discussed coordinating projects with the Potomac Heritage National Scenic Trail, the Marchers and bicyclists. Plans include inviting a number of elected and government officials in Interior and the National Park Service.

Bill Poindexter of Adventure Cycling had discussions with several of us to discuss possibilities of biking the NHT, which will certainly add a dimension and new partners to the trail experience. Timing some of the biking activities with events planned by the Marchers offer some exciting possibilities for building awareness and sharing information about the NHT. Check out Bill's blog for updated information.

The Potomac Heritage National Scenic Trail, led by Superintendent Don Briggs, is planning a route between Mount Vernon and Prince William which also shares resources and constituents with the Washington-Rochambeau NHT. They have invited us to participate in a workshop to plan and walk the route. This may also offer an opportunity for the Marchers and bicycle enthusiasts to participate in a reconnaissance trip to help plan the route from Mount Vernon to Prince William Forest Park and beyond.

On March 27, Joe visited Suffern NY at the invitation of Carolyn Suffern. She introduced me to the town and to Craig Long, the town's historian. Carolyn's ideas have stimulated discussion and they are certainly more aware of the Washington Rochambeau Revolutionary Route National Historic Trail and the tourism potential. We hope community interest grows and they become engaged in the dialog about the future of their downtown and the community.

We continue to receive more and more requests for information, comment and assistance from organizations and the general public. We are doing our best to provide timely, helpful responses and referrals. We are also moving ahead with plans to get the NPS web page up and running and we are exploring the application of social media.

The 2011 Kodak American Greenways Awards

Previous recipients have undertaken projects that included the design of a water trail and tourism guide in Columbia, NC; the conversion of an abandoned rail line into a multi-use public trail along the historic Mission Zanja irrigation canal; planting flowers along a community trail to brighten an impoverished neighborhood of Los Angeles; and creating a county-wide greenway and tourism plan in Joe Daviess County, IL.
