Washington-Rochambeau Revolutionary Route News -- May 2011

Samantha Driscoll has joined us as a full time historian who will be working as the preservation planner for the Washington-Rochambeau Revolutionary Route National Historic Trail (NHT). Samantha, as many of you know, worked with us as a planning assistant under the Student Temporary Employment Program while she was completing her graduate studies at University of Pennsylvania. She received her Master of Science in Historic Preservation and graduated with honors in May. Samantha also completed a Bachelor of Science in Architecture from the University of Maryland. Samantha will be activating the NPS website and other media to help get the word out about the NHT; gathering information for future comprehensive planning and resource preservation efforts; preparing GIS maps and information about related sites; and developing partnerships. She will be working in Philadelphia at the U.S. Custom House, 200 Chestnut Street on the 3rd floor (370E). Her phone number is 215-597-2334 and her email address is samantha_driscoll@nps.gov.

Joe DiBello and Samantha Driscoll drafted a strategic plan and summary of the strategic workshops held last year. We will use the plan and summary of the workshops as the foundation for future planning efforts and will incorporate broader public input as we move into a more detailed planning process. Samantha is undertaking an inventory of the route and sites and possible tourism destinations along the full length of the Washington-Rochambeau Revolutionary Route NHT. We have also been consulting the Report to Congress on the Historic Preservation of Revolutionary War and War of 1812 Sites, multiple websites, and the state focused historical reports by Dr. Selig. We hope to categorize the sites by national, state, local or municipal management and ownership and also identify sites owned and managed by private organizations. The mapping is underway, and Google Maps are now available for the corridor. Please see the end of the newsletter for all the links to the Google maps. All comments, questions and revisions are welcome.

The Marcher's are planning a June 2011 to October 2011 walk along the NHT. We think this a great opportunity to feature a series of local events and engage local communities along this

more than 700 mile route. A major event and reenactment being planned at Mount Vernon on September 9, 10 and 11 and it is a great opportunity to showcase the NHT. Some are working towards organizing an event in the Boston area. We are looking for ways that NPS can help or participate in an event in your community. Please let Joe or the Marchers know if you are interested in or hosting an event in your area that we may participate in.

With the help of the Northern Virginia Regional Planning Commission, the Potomac Heritage National Scenic Trail held a workshop May 4th to examine routes between Mount Vernon and Prince William Forest Park which also share resources and constituents with the Washington-Rochambeau NHT. Joe participated in the May 4 workshop. Joe also met with Alexandria officials to incorporate the NHT with their trail plans and to connect with points north.

Samantha participated in a conference call organized by Anna Cosner of George Washington's Mount Vernon about collaborating with them on events they have planned for Sept 9, 10 and 11. The events are planned to include an encampment, reenactment, and ceremony commemorating the events upon Washington and Rochambeau's arrival to Mount Vernon. The discussion included coordinating projects with the Marchers, visitors, and press. There are also plans to invite elected and government officials in the Department of the Interior and the National Park Service for a ceremonial kick-off to the weekend events.

Joe DiBello attended the 13th National Trails System Conference in Abingdon, Virginia, May 14-18, 201. The annual conference focused on how trails contribute to community, human, environmental, economic and educational health. This conference highlighted the value of trails and showcased the great work being done across the country through the workshops, plenary discussions and field trips organized around these themes. Ralph Nelson represented W3R-US and they are interested in joining The Partnership for the National Trail System and becoming part of the network.

Bill Poindexter is exploring support and coordinating events while bicycling the NHT. This will certainly add a new dimension and new partners to the trail experience. Timing some of the biking activities with events planned by the Marchers offer some exciting possibilities for building awareness and sharing information about the NHT. Bill's planned ride will begin July 1 on Martha's Vineyard and end in Williamsburg. Learn more about it here:

The 2011 Kodak American Greenways Awards

Deadline for Application: June 15th, 2011

Do you know an organization that is working to create or improve a greenway, trail or waterway? Apply for a Kodak American Greenways Award grant, and your organization could receive up to \$2,500 in grant funds and recognition that comes with selection by this prestigious national program. The Eastman Kodak Company, The Conservation Fund and the National Geographic Society team up each year to present the Kodak American Greenways Awards Program. One major element of the Program involves "seed" grant awards to organizations that are growing our nation's network of greenways, blueways, trails and natural areas. These projects connect Americans to the outdoors and their heritage.

For 2011, the Program anticipates awarding up to fifty percent of the grants to those greenways projects that demonstrate the convergence of economic prosperity and the environment. The vitality of a community depends not only on its economic prospects but also on the quality of its natural environment and outdoor recreational space. Previous recipients have undertaken projects that included the design of a water trail and tourism guide in Columbia, NC; the conversion of an abandoned rail line into a multi-use public trail along the historic Mission Zanja irrigation canal; planting flowers along a community trail to brighten an impoverished neighborhood of Los Angeles; and creating a county-wide greenway and tourism plan in Joe Daviess County, IL. Please see the application for full details and to apply for consideration of your greenway project for Kodak American Greenway Award funding.

NPS Rivers, Trails and Conservation Assistance

The mission of the Rivers, Trails and Conservation Assistance (RTCA) is to assist community-led natural resource conservation and outdoor recreation initiatives. RTCA staff provide help (sorry...no money) to communities so they can conserve waterways, preserve open space, and develop trails and greenways. RTCA has helped us develop the strategic plan for the NHT. Water trails, or blueways, are a great way to get people down to the water, and help communities connect to their waterways. The National Park Service is currently helping local efforts to create water trails in 48 communities across the country through its Rivers, Trails and Conservation Assistance program. Waterways played a huge role in the Washington- Rochambeau Revolutionary Route and there may be opportunities to combine paddling and history along the route. Do you have an idea for a local conservation and outdoor recreation project along the NHT? We will have to fill out an RTCA Application which are due August 1. Please let me know if you are interested in pursuing this.

Generally, financial assistance available to restore historic buildings and homes can be divided into the three categories below. Orton Family Foundation

The Orton Family Foundation seeks to partner with four new communities in the second round of its five-year, \$10 million Heart & Soul Community Planning initiative. The initiative challenges citizens to imagine and achieve a better future for themselves and their town through an innovative community planning process. The Request for Proposals (RFP) was released.

The Foundation will select four towns with a population under 30,000—two in New England and two in the northern Rocky Mountain West. Each selected community will receive training, technical assistance, and \$100,000 in supporting funds over two years as they pursue a Heart & Soul Community Planning project. The submission deadline for proposals is July 20, 2011.

Pennsylvania Statewide Preservation Plan

Trail and conservation organizations as well as the general public are encouraged to participate in an upcoming public forum, the feedback from which will help shape the new PA Statewide Historic Preservation Plan. The regional public forums will present the results of last year's value survey and moderate a discussion to identify how to best preserve those values through the Commonwealth's historic preservation-related programs. The primary goal of the planning process is for the public to inform the Pennsylvania's State Historic Preservation Office of what they value in their community in

order to determine the preservation priorities of people who live and work in Pennsylvania. This plan will help the state identify, prioritize and address historic preservation needs over the course of the next five years.
