


#### Recent News

Mapping the NHT through the development of GIS files in addition to the Google Maps already available (see below) is still underway. Our headquarters in Washington DC are leading an effort to create GIS map files for all National trails, parks, landmarks and heritage areas. This project will create a unified and consistent NPS map that will be easily accessible by the public, also serving to clearly highlight the many locations where Washington-Rochambeau NHT connects with NPS units, trails and related areas.

The draft strategic plan provides a foundation for future planning and activities for the NHT. The cooperative agreement with W3R-US calls for us to work together to carry out these activities. It also requires a work plan which identifies priority activities and projects. The draft strategic plan is available

Thanks to Dominic Cardea, Acting Chief of Interpretation and Education, NER, and the Harper's Ferry Center, we have completed and are printing the unigrid brochure for the NHT. We expect delivery in early November. The final graphics for the NHT logo are also complete. We hope to launch the NPS web site this fall to further help get the word out about the NHT.



We have submitted a proposal for the Policy Analysis Exercise (PAE) at the Harvard Kennedy School, in which a Master in Public Policy student and faculty advisors analyze organizational issues related to an organization, for the W3R-US. The W3R-US, as a national partner of the National Park Service, has an instrumental role in implementing the Washington- Rochambeau Revolutionary Route National Historic Trail. The W3R-US would serve as the primary client, and would receive analysis and recommendations that will help them expand their membership, increase their capacity and generate revenue so that they can become a sustainable organization. The NPS will participate, provide technical assistance and help with incidental expenses if the project is chosen.

We continue to receive more and more requests for information, comment and assistance from organizations and the general public. We are doing our best to provide timely, helpful responses and referrals. We are also moving ahead with plans to get the NPS web page up and running and we are exploring the application of social media. #### Gadsby's Tavern Museum Hosting George Washington Lecture October 12

Join Dr. Peter Henriques, Professor Emeritus of History from George Mason University, as he presents "The Man in the Middle: Washington's Relationship with the Marquis de Lafayette and Gouverneur Morris" on Wednesday, October 12, at Gadsby's Tavern Museum, 134 North Royal Street, in Old Town Alexandria. In the late 18th and early 19th centuries, Gadsby's Tavern was the center of social and political life in Alexandria and the new Federal City of Washington. The tavern served as the premier gathering place for residents – including Washington – and visitors to eat, drink, learn, and influence history.

Lecture tickets cost \$12 per person and \$10 for members of Gadsby's Tavern Museum Society and Gadsby's Tavern Museum volunteers. Doors open at 7 p.m. and the lecture begins at 7:30 p.m. Tickets may be purchased by calling 703.746.4242 or through the online shop at www.gadsbystavern.org.



# National Park Service's American Battlefield Protection Program (ABPP)

The National Park Service has awarded \$1.2 million in grants to fund 25 projects over 76 battlefields under the American Battlefield Protection Program. This year's grants provide funding for projects at endangered battlefields from the Pequot War, King Philip's War, Revolutionary War, War of 1812, Civil War, World War II and various Indian Wars. Awards were given to projects in 24 states or territories entailing archeology, mapping, cultural resource survey work, documentation, planning, education and interpretation. Priority was given to those groups submitting applications for nationally significant battlefields. One chosen battlefield was the Revolutionary War site of Two Bridges Battlefield in New Jersey. This battlefield was in the town of Branchburg and demonstrated the resolve of local militia to defend against the British and loyalist troops. This chosen site is very close to the Washington-Rochambeau NHT mapped route of New Jersey. The site is visible on this map of New Jersey.

# NPS Updates "Strategies for Protecting Archeological Sites on Private Lands"

The NPS Heritage Preservation Services website "Strategies for Protecting Archeological Sites on Private Lands" has been updated. "Strategies" is a guide to the wide variety of tools available for protecting archeological sites on private lands. The site contains information on strategies currently being used throughout the U.S., case studies, keys to success, contact information, and links to other sources of useful information. Key strategies include land ownership, financial strategies, development regulation, laws specific to archeology, voluntary strategies, and site management.

The development of this web site was a collaborative effort of two NPS cultural resource programs (Heritage Preservation Services and Archeology Program), The Archaeological Conservancy, the Society for American Archaeology, the Society for Historical Archaeology, the National Trust for Historic Preservation, and the National Conference of State Historic Preservation Officers.
